Rationale and Objectives

The Master of Hospital Administration (MHA) program provides the students with the basic knowledge, concepts and principles in the field of health care administration with emphasis on hospital/health care organizations. It also aims to develop proper attitudes and skills to manage a hospital efficiently and effectively.

At the end of the MHA program, the student should be able to:

- Administer health care organizations effectively, efficiently and in an ethical manner:
- · Apply the latest developments in the field as appropriate to their specific organizational and socio-cultural contexts;
- Establish effective working relationship with co-workers, other organizations, and the larger community;
- Integrate research methods in hospital administration;
- Manage change in hospital administration guided by evidence; and
- Communicate effectively orally and in writing.

Academic Information

The academic year is divided into 2 semesters of 16 weeks each, excluding registration and final examination periods. The 1st semester starts in August and ends in December, while the 2nd semester covers the period from January to May. The summer session following the 2nd semester is in June and July. Classes are held Monday through Friday, 8:00am to 7:30pm. There are Saturday classes also. (Ref: Approval of Policy Change in Academic Calendar, pending UP BOR approval, UPM Council Special Meeting on 24 October 2013. BSLR-E College of Medicine).

English is generally used as the medium of instruction. A full time student's normal load is 12-15 units per semester and 6 units during summer: a part-time student enrolls in half of these. The tuition fee is P990.00 per unit, the library fee is P1,050.00 and other fees is P350.00 per semester. A student with a load of 15 units in a semester pays a matriculation fee of P14.850.00, on the average, while a foreign student pays an additional Educational Development Fund of US \$500.00 (US \$100.00 for residency only) for every semester.

There is a processing fee of P300.00 for Filipino applicants while interested foreigners are charged US \$30.00) (circa Nov. 2013)

Admission to the MHA program is open once a year before the start of the 1st semester of each academic year.

Admission Requirements

The following are the minimum NGOHS requirements:

- 1. Good scholastic record from any recognized institution of higher learning
- 2. At least 1 year work experience in a related field
- 3. Duy accomplished Application Form (available at the Graduate Office or through www.ngohs.upm.edu.ph) together with the following documents:
- Original copy of the official Transcript of Records
- 2 recommendations from former professors, supervisors or employees (forms included in the application packet)
- Receipt of processing fee paid at the UPM Cashier's Office
- Certified true copy of college diploma with the seal of the university and the signature of the registrar in ink
- 4 passport-size photos
- Essay on an 8-1/2" x 11" sheet of paper describing your motivation for pursuing graduate study and your view of selfdirected learning as a method of instruction, and a description of your research interest
- 4. For foreign applicants, additional requirement s include:
 - Original Transcript of Records in English. If written in another language, must be translated to English and authenticated by the Philippine consulate/embassy from country of origin
 - Certified true copy of diploma with the seal of the university and the signature of the registrar in ink. If written in another language, must be translated to English and authenticated by the Philippine consulate/embassy from country of origin
 - TOEFL (or its equivalent) score of at least 500 (written test) or 173 (computerized test) if English is not the medium of instruction in the country of origin.
- ✓ Affidavit of support or certification of financial capability
- Photocopy of passport (present original for verification)

Graduation Requirements

- Residency for at least one academic year immediately prior to awarding of degree
- Completion of 38 units which may be fulfilled through any of the following:

PLAN A – at least 32 units of formal courses and 6 units of thesis.

- PLAN B at least 35 units formal courses and 3 units special study
- PLAN C at least 38 units formal courses and passing the written comprehensive examination

• A GWA of 2.00 or better in all courses taken, provided there is no grade of 5.00 in any of them. If the weighted average of 2.00 is not attained, the Certificate of Attendance in Hospital Administration may be given. A certificate of attendance will also be issued to students with a grade of "5.0" in any subject.

The following are the grade requirements for each student to be of good standing in the program: a) general weighted average of 2.00 or better, b) weighted average of 2.00 or better for the major/required courses, and c) no grade of 5.00 in any academic course. A maximum of 5 years is given to a student to finish the program.

Living accommodations for students' maybe provided in privately-owned housing units/dorms/apartment hotels. Dorms offer lodging and/or board. There are privately-owned food establishments around the school.
